		<p>TR comment - Pinwood meadow estate is circa. 7 hectares in total, with a total of circa. 0.56 hectares of open space available (a sum of the Pinwood park area + the small area of grass at the junction of pinwood meadow road and spruce close). This gives a current open space allocation of 8% for the existing estate. This already falls below current standards and will be further reduced by the introduction of the access road to the new development cutting through both these areas. We are lucky to have these green spaces currently, and they are used as recreational spaces on a daily basis. This space is safe for children to run around and enjoy currently, with only slow moving traffic on the perimeter within juniper close. To put a road through the middle of this would not only further reduce the available space, it would make it an unsafe environment for children to play freely.</p>
