He can't walk far, or on steep inclines, but walking these fields has helped stem the progression his peripheral neuropathy.

Walking these fields has also enabled a growing number of people in the community, and beyond, to socially distance, whilst getting exercise and fresh air.

I understand the pressing need for housing, but implore you to look at greener ways of providing it, such as brownfield sites and abandoned premises and retail sites around the city. The value of nature, in its simplest form, is immeasurable. To rest ones eyes on the far horizon, with empty space and fresh air, and so near to the city centre, is a gift to be treasured and protected. Visitors from Liverpool, York, London, and Canada have marvelled at the beautiful views from these and neighbouring fields, which are an asset to the city.

If you haven't walked these fields and the ones beyond, please do, and experience the amazing views and tranquility for yourself.

From a safety and practical point of view, Pinwood Meadow Drive has always had challenges with on-road parking lining both sides of the road.
